Another attractive one was a black picture hat with brim made of soft frills and tucks of chiffon, high crown of pretty jet, trimmed with three large Amazon plumes and knots of chiffon. A greatly admired hat was a mushroom brim, covered with white maline and fancy straw, rolls of white chiffon, covered with elegant applique lace and dainty maiden-hair fern at front and side, large bunches of chiffon on side band. A beautiful black and gold combination was a large drooping shape raised high at side by band, the entire hat being draped with black gauze embroidered with gold.
