A Township Suit. A case of general interest was engaged before Chancellor Boyd in Orangeville on Wednesday last, being a suit for damages entered by Mr. Archy McIntyre against the township of Melancthon for \$2,400 damages for injuries received by being thrown from his rig while driving home from Dundalk some months ago. The plaintiff alleged that in rounding a corner on his way home he ran into an obstruction on the road and received injuries which will be permanent. A feature of the case was the contradictory evidence offered by three doctors on each side, the first alleging that the plaintiff had received injuries to his nervous system from which he would never recover, and three others declaring that such symptoms were totally lacking. The defence produced evidence to prove that the plaintiff was under the influence of liquor at the time and that he had arrived at the scene of the accident in the dusk of the evening, when it was light enough to distinguish obstacles on the road. The plaintiff admitted having taken three glasses of whiskey, but said that, as Dundalk whiskey was watered it was weak, and he was sober. The judge held that the accident would not have occurred had the plaintiff been sober and that while the road might have been in better condition, the accident was largely the fault of the plaintiff.
