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

FLESHERTON HAPPENINGS The following extract which we take from the Welland Telegraph is evidence of how Mr. M. Richardson's efforts to promote reforms in road making are appreciated in other parts of this province. "Mr. Richardson, M.P., one of the Provincial Committee, was," says The Telegraph, "the only member not present at the last conference. He has been a fearless advocate of road-making reform and was the first man to support by resolution the principle of Government aid as the only substantial means of encouraging municipalities to improve their main highways. The adoption of this principle has done more to advance the all former conventions that could not before agree on any definite plan of action, and we now see this same principle of State aid as being the main moving force or central idea that has brought about the present splendid forward movement here in Welland County." It was, we believe, principally through Mr. Richardson's active interest in this matter that the County Convention was held, and partly through the same cause that the Provincial Convention was held in Toronto two years ago to which he was appointed a delegate by Grey County Council. At the Toronto Convention his proposition to appoint a committee to wait upon the Provincial Government with the object of enlisting the interest of the Government and getting financial aid for improving the highways of the Province met with much opposition. Several members of the Legislature and one member of the Government were present and all, we are informed, said it was uscless to attempt it; that the Government could not and would not give any financial aid. Some, we learned, went so far as to say that the proposition was only ade for the purpose of embarassing the Government.
