Christian Science Exposed.

The doctrine of Christian Science is very clearly explained and its errors fully demonstrated in a little volume by Rev. J. P. Sheraton, D.D., LL.D., Principal of Wyllie College, Toronto.

The paper was first read at a conference at Barrie in September, 1900, and afterwards given as a lecture at Wyllie College. The history of the movement begun by Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy in 1860, and which in later years was developed, into the system called Christian Science is fully traced; its fallacies and impossibilities clearly demonstrated, and its claims as to the healing of disease shown to be entirely without foundation. The volume is for sale at 5 cents per copy, and since a master mind has accomplished the task of meeting and combating the error, it is desirable that the public may avail themselves of this means of becoming informed on the subject.

Want a New Religion.

Pekin is the present political capital of Christendom; there you can put your finger upon the pulse of the nations; all eyes are turned toward that great city. It is the greatest political school in the world; there the nations are gaining an education and insight into Chinese affairs which they have never possessed before.

Thus said Dr. William S. Allen, the returned missionary, speaking at the First Congregational Church, Chicago, upon "The Present Situation in China."

Continuing he said: "It is remarkable fact that in this great Chinese nation, one of the oldest among the civilized, the very home of conservatism, the natives are beginning to realize the need of new ideas, and modernism is fast gaining a foothold. Only a few days before I left China a prominent Chinese gentleman said to me, 'We Chinese know that we need many things, but first of all we need a new religion, and that is what they do need a new religion.' Christianity is thoroughly adequate for the regeneration of the Chinese, but Christianity now has more influence among the Chinese than it ever had. The converts of Chinese appreciate the Christian religion more than they did a year ago; the church is by no means exterminated or even weakened; it is still full of vigor and I look forward to a bright and glorious future for it in the Chinese Empire."
