The Methodist District meeting in Owen Sound on Thursday and Friday last was a very satisfactory one, indicating material progress during the conference year now drawing to a close. The reports from the different churches in the district were presented, showing financial increases, as well as increases in the membership. Rev. Mr. Buchanan was elected representative on the stationing committee, and C. W. Rutledge to the Missionary Committee. Markdale stood at the head of the list in the amount of funds raised for the year.

On Monday the Premier introduced the bill to increase the sessional indemnities of the members, and in doing so expressed the hope that the people would approve. The \$1,000 indemnity was provided when sessions lasted two months, but now when sessions frequently extend over three, four and five months an increase was reasonable. The indemnity attached to the new Parliament in Australia is \$2,000. He believed the day had passed when sessions of the Canadian Parliament could be kept within four or five months. The bill received the support of both parties and has become law.

## Good Times for The Farmers.

For the past year things have been coming the farmer's way pretty well. He has had good crops and good prices for everything he has had to sell, but we fancy there is nothing that has paid the farmers better than the raising of hogs. The hog situation for the past year has been a most remarkable one and we think there is good times ahead for the hog raisers for a long time to come. There are several things that has brought this about, but possibly there is nothing that has done more for the present high price of hogs than the organization and operation of two or three new pork packing houses by the farmers. The nearest one to the farmers in this district is the one situated in Palmerston, which has now over a thousand farmers as shareholders, and that number is being increased very rapidly. The farmers realize that it is in their interest to support this factory and quite recently a large quantity of stock has been sold to the farmers in the vicinity of Brussels and Wingham and another large lot in the vicinity of Ridgeway. Many of the present shareholders say that they have already got back, on account of the extra price of hogs, all that they have invested in the factory. The farmers also say that they should support this factory so as to keep the Packing Houses from going into a combine.—Mt. Forest Representative.
