The Reeve reported that he had met the Reeve of Sullivan and the police trustees of Chatsworth and had arrived at an agreement giving the police village one-thirtieth of all moneys raised by the municipality for road purposes and one twentieth of the cess fund. The report was adopted. Messrs. J. Adams and Thos. Dicoen addressed the council on behalf of the Central Agricultural Society. The council granted the society \$15, and 15 to the Holland society.
