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## County Council

FRIDAY MORNING

The Warden drew attention to the fact that the Ontario Government proposed expending one million dollars for the improvement of roads throughout the Province, and there was no reason why Grey County should not receive a share.

Several accounts were presented and were referred to the finance committee.

The finance committee reported having made the county valuation as follows: Artemesia, \$1,140,000; Bentinck, \$1,105,000; Collingwood, \$1,420,000; Derby, \$740,000; Euphrasia, \$1,170,000; Egremont, \$1,245,000; Glenelg, \$800,000; Holland, \$860,000; Keppel, \$700,000; Normaaby, \$1,570,000; Oaprey, \$975,000; Proton, \$1,025,000; St. Vincent, \$2,420,000; Sydenham, \$1,230,000; Sullivan, \$1,225,000; Sarawak, \$320,000; Owen Sound, \$1,750,000; Meaford, \$430,000; Durham, \$200,000; Thornbury, \$160,000; Dundalk, \$115,000; Hanover, \$200,000; Markdale, \$245,000; Total, \$20,191,000.

Messrs. Watson and McArthur were appointed to meet Mr. Allan, chairman road and bridge committee of the County of Wellington, re deviation and bridge on county line between the townships of Proton and West Luther, and to secure an engineer and find out the probable cost of the proposed improvements and report at the November session.

Education Committee reported having accepted Inspector Grier's request for holidays after the mid-summer examinations. The committee also recommended having Inspector Campbell's report published in the minutes.

The report of the Printing Committee, recommending the payment of the various accounts received, was adopted by the Council.

By-law No. 602, fixing the assessment of the various municipalities for the year 1902 was read a first time.

By-law 603, levying rate to meet current expenses was read a first time.

By-law 601, re detaching of certain lands from the corporation of the town of Owen Sound and annexing them to the township of Sydenham, and the appointing of an arbitrator in case of arbitration being necessary, was read a first time.

On motion of Councillors Agnew and Sohenk, by-laws 601, 602 and 603 were read a second time.

Councillors Harpess and Ries introduced a motion asking the Council to memorialize the Ontario Legislature to amend the Municipal Act to vest the reeves of the municipalities shall constitute the county council. This motion was laid on the table until the November session.

McArthur-McColman-That Councillors McDonald, Preston, Allan and the mover be a committee to inquire into the feasibility of taking advantage of the offer made by the Ontario Government re road improvements. Carried.

Harpess-Pringle-That the gaol surgeon be required to report at the June and November sessions the number of patients and their condition. Carried.

SATURDAY MORNING.

The finance committee presented report No. 5 recommending the payment of election expenses of G. P. Hare, clerk of Holland, amounting to \$18.40. The report was adopted.

Road and Bridge committee's report was also adopted, recommending payment of Chas. Gordon's account for inspecting bridges amounting to \$33.40. The Communications and Materials committee recommended the filing of the presentment of the Grand Jury. Report was adopted.

Mr. Gordon asked that Mr. McArthur's name be coupled with that of Mr. Watson to act in the matter of reporting the probable cost of securing deviation and building bridge on county line between townships of Proton in Grey, and West Luther, in Dufferin, cost to be divided equally between the two counties.

By-law 604, to appoint arbitrators in the matter of appeal against the action of the Township of Proton in regard to by-law 64, was read a first, second and third time and passed. The arbitrators are Judge Crease, Inspector Campbell and Councillors Allen, McColman and Preston.

Councillors McDonald and Agnew introduced a resolution thanking the Board and Council of Markdale for the kind and courteous treatment the council received at their ladies, and also for the very pleasant drive given them, enabling them to see the beautiful scenery and view a large section of the County.

Councillor Shute gave notice that he would introduce a by-law at the November session to appoint valuers to make a county valuation, believing it was necessary.

Councillor Harpess gave notice that he would introduce a by-law at the next session to provide funds for the erection of a House of Refuge.

The County Clerk was granted \$10 and the County Treasurer \$15.50 for extra expenses incurred by holding session in Markdale. Geo. Noble was granted \$5 for services during the session.

The Warden thanked the council for their indulgence during the session, and said he had endeavored to perform the duties to the best of his abilities. He was sorry the Judicial Report was not ready to submit to the people, but it was impossible.

Mr. McColman gave the Council a kind invitation to meet in Thornbury on the 11th inst. He said he would be delighted to have them travel the roads that were so beautiful. He was a beautiful occasion at that time.

On motion of Councillors Agnew and Pringle the Council adjourned to meet in Owen Sound on November 20th. After singing "God Save the King" the Council adjourned.

Cost of Seeing the Pan-American. (From the Miller Mill.) Extravagant stories as to the cost of board and lodging have been going about the country and may have deterred some of our readers from planning to visit the Pan-American Exposition.

The only basis for these stories is the fact that a few of the larger and more fashionable hotels are asking, and getting, rates as high as eight to ten dollars a day, which certainly is enough to stagger a man of moderate means. But there are many respectable hotels and countless boarding houses and private homes where one may lodge comfortably for not to exceed one dollar a night, and meals can be procured both within and without the "exposition grounds for prices little if any above the normal. We say this after careful investigation, and we have placed millers through our free Accommodation Bureau at rates which fully sustain our statement. Leaving out the cost of railroad fare and sleeping car berth, which varies with the distance, the day's list of expenses in Buffalo may be set down as follows: Lodging, \$1.00; Three meals, \$1.50; Admission to the grounds, 50 cts.; Incidentals, 60 cts.; Total for one day and night, \$3.40. These figures are neither high nor low. They are moderate and reliable. By a little effort eating-places can be found that will bring the item of meals considerably nearer one dollar. Under incidentals we include such expenditures as street-car fare; one or more Midway admissions at ten to twenty-five cents each; light refreshments at five cents and upward, and so forth.

The Council met on June 10 as an adjourned Court of Revision. Members all present. Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last sitting of the Court read and confirmed.

Caswell for the north half of lot 29, con. 11; Fred Booby assessed jointly with John Irwin for lot 23, con. 1; John Cornfield assessed as tenant for J. Cherry for the north quarter of lot 9, con. 8; Elizabeth Martin assessed for the west half of lot 8, and the name of G. Martin struck from the roll; Robert Broadner assessed for the west half of lot 23 con. 8, and said lot taken from the assessment of Hugh Patton; Thos. Fawcett, assessed as tenant for the south half of lot 2 con. 2. On motion, by Mr. Miller and Mr. Patton, the assessment roll was confirmed as finally revised.

The Council resumed at 2 p. m. for the despatch of general township business. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of the last session of the council read and confirmed.

Patton-Miller—That Michael Dillon be exempted from doing statute labor as he is unable to work and in limited circumstances.—Carried.

Pringle-Miller—That the council allow Mr. Hammond to move his weigh scales to the east side of the road opposite his store in Kimberley.—Carried.

Pringle-Richardson—That this council make Mr. Bath the offer of \$30 per acre for a roadway along the North side of his farm from 3rd line to valley road.—Carried.

Mr. Miller objected to the price offered for the said land.

Pringle-Richardson—That Mr. Miller and the Reeve be appointed to have the bridge across the river on 18 and 19 sideroad be replaced with as little delay as possible, the work to be left to their judgement in what way it should be built.—Carried.

Patton-Pringle—That the Treasurer advance to Mr. Miller sufficient funds to pay for sewer pipe if the said pipe is purchased by him.—Carried.

Richardson-Patton—That Mr. Rob. Fawcett receive the sum of \$7 for the right of way across his lot for five years, the same to be paid \$3 the first year and \$1 per year for the remaining four years.—Carried.

By-law No. 54 confirming the award of the arbitrators re U.S.S. No. 5, Euphrasia and Collingwood and S. S. No. 21 was then passed.

Hammond for goods furnished Eber Smith, \$8.95; Miss Cuiry, for keeping Mrs. Isaac 9 weeks \$2.40.
