S. S. Convention.

The annual convention of Euphrasia Sunday School Association was held in the Victoria Methodist church, Rocklyn, on Friday, June the 28th, at 1.30, p. m.

The following officers were present: Honorary President, the Rev. J. F. McLaren, D. D.; President, Rev. J. S. Davidson, B. A.; Treasurer, W. Boyd; Secretary, T. Gilray. The opening exercises were conducted by the President.

The minutes of last convention were read by the Secretary, on motion being made, were adopted.

The first subject on the program was assigned to Mr. T. White. Mr. White not being present Mr. H. Buffalo and the Pan-American.

Emerging from the Mansion House the other day I found a young woman of my acquaintance leaning restfully upon her bicycle and looking earnestly in the direction of scores of baggage-carrying people who were wending their way to the cars on Main street.

"I'd just like to go and speak to them," she said. "Ella thought there would be a big rush during the Pan-American and made preparations to accommodate roomers, but so far she hasn't had one." This about illustrates the situation. Housewives of high and low degree, rich and poor, who had a room, or an attic, or cot space to spare, prepared to make money on the side. Wherever you go, east, west, north or south, you are met by the legends "furnished rooms to let," "accommodation for Pan-American visitors," etc.

About six weeks ago some Delaware avenue lodging-house people conceived the notion of giving their premises a name. "The idea spread like wild-fire, and now the nomenclature is to old timers laughable, if not disgusting. Domiciles which have little to recommend them but fill with gilt signs having some high sounding appellation. Old fashioned office buildings, vacant for years, now have glittering signs, and every outward appearance indicates that they are hotels of long standing. A big hospital recently went out of business. It was an emergency affair, and in the old days did a "land office" business. Its rooms have housed the main, the halt and the blind, all classes and conditions of men and women, and it is expected that they will soon be filled with tired sleepers, whose rest will doubtless be refreshed by visions of delirium tremens, etc. Notwithstanding all this splendid accommodation can be readily obtained at reasonable rates in desirable locations, and in the homes of reliable people. The best residential section of Buffalo is that known as the West Side. The West Side means all that portion west of Main street and north of and including Niagara street. The Exposition grounds are on the outskirts of this area. A dwelling-house or a furnished room on the East Side, though equally good, will ordinarily rent for fifty per cent less than on the West side. The reason for this is apparent. The negroes and foreigners live on the East side. The "red-light" district and the concert hall dives are there. Still, in the northeastern portion of the city there are beautiful homes and good citizens, and the reader will make no mistake in selecting a lodging-place north of Tupper street on the East side. On the extreme East side he will also be perfectly safe. This vast unoccupied district contains many beautiful homes occupied by thoroughly respectable citizens. It comprises that portion of the city east of Jefferson street commonly called "East Buffalo," and is well known to many STRANDERS readers because the stock-yards are located there. My advice to intending visitors would be to complete no arrangements in advance unless, of course, with people you know. There are thousands of idle rooms available. To have congenial rooming quarters is important, if you are to enjoy yourself. Devote half a day to finding something suitable. You will be quoted one dollar per night per person for lodgings in most private homes, but if there is a party don't be afraid to "chow" a little and you will probably get satisfactory reductions. If you wish to locate near the grounds you will find it easy to do so, but remember that Buffalo street car service is the best in America, that arrangements for handling the Pan-American crowds are perfect, and that you can go to any part of the city for five cents. As to meals, most people who accommodate lodgers serve breakfast for a quarter. There are scores of restaurants down town where excellent meals can be had for a quarter, and on the grounds, if not too fastidious, you can be fed cheaply enough.

It would be superfluous to add to what has been written concerning the Exposition itself. Every detail is now complete, and the enterprise is worthy of all the praise that has been bestowed upon it. Just a word about the Canadian building. I visited it on Friday afternoon, in company with two congenial spirits, former residents of Euphrasia, and we unanimously agreed that for beauty and concentrated common sense it stands unequalled.

Buffalo's down town streets give abundant evidence that there is "something" doing. Sid shows abound. It looks like Walters Falls or Rocklyn or Markdale on a fair day. Temporary booths and fairs are everywhere, and if the visitor gets away without investing in souvenirs it will not be because he has not been sufficiently importuned.
