The Census.

The first official announcement of the census of Canada for 1901 has been made. In a few districts the records are as yet incomplete, but the figures for them have been estimated in part. The returns for the extreme northern portions of Quebec and Ontario, and for the organized territories of Athabasca, Franklin, Kewatin, Mackenzie, Ungava and Yukon have not been received.

These figures deal with families, dwellings and populations. The total population is given as 5,328,883, as against 4,893,269 in 1891, being an increase of 505,614.

The total families show 1,042,264, as against 921,043 in 1891; dwellings, 1,004,652 as against 877,586 in 1891.

The change in the populations of the provinces are increases: British Columbia, 91,827; Manitoba, 83,858; New Brunswick, 9,880; Nova Scotia, 8,700; Ontario, 53,657; Quebec, 132,430; the Territories, 78,201. The unorganized territories, 42,832.

There is one decrease: Prince Edward Island has decreased 5,820.
