Creo Nation Starving.
The Rev. F. Stevens, a Methodist
clergyman, who has been on a long
missionary trip to the borders of the
Barren Lands, 400 miles north of
Winnipeg, returned to civilization
August 16th with a thrilling story of
suffering and death among the Creo
Indians in that section. He says that
1400 are all that survive of the nation,
and that they are starving to death,
and that they are eating vegetable food
They have no flesh or vegetable food
of any kind, and are living on a scanty
vegetation, not sufficiently sustaining
to keep life for any length of time. In
his trip of more than 1000 miles through
the barren district Mr. Stevens says
he saw the bodies of forty Indians who
had died of starvation, and hundreds
of others were in the last stages of
starvation.
