Among the Indians.

An interesting feature of the quarterly praise service in the Methodist church last Thursday evening, under the auspices of the Women's Missionary Auxiliary was an address by Mrs. Stevens, wife of the Rev. F. G. Stevens, late of Oxford House Mission. After four years practical experience in that northern region, out of from home comforts and civilization, a review of incidents and privations of both natives and missionaries by a former respected citizen could not but prove intensely interesting. Six hundred miles north of Winnipeg, nearly half of which distance must be travelled by canoe, requiring from three to four weeks laborious toil, arriving where the face of a white woman had never before been seen; here to manipulate a parish of 600 square miles over which fourteen hundred Indians are scattered; only four mails a year from the outside world to break the monotony; too far north for potatoes or garden stuff to mature, in fact there being neither eggs, potatoes, or meat in that whole region, supplies being obtainable only from Winnipeg. The Indians strive to feed and clothe themselves from the scanty supply of ur bearing animals which are yearly becoming more scarce, and during the few months in summer by fishing in the lakes, all of which fail to sustain life, as many are known to have died of starvation. Add to this the fact that their prospects for the future are even more gloomy than the present owing to the constantly decreasing supply of that from which they have subsisted or do now subsist, this picture is indeed pathetic. Mrs. Stevens has undergone hardships which few would face and fewer could endure. Rev. Mr. Stevens has been granted a year without a charge in order that he may endeavor to bring to the notice of the Government the true condition of affairs so as to have the Indians of that region removed and located in a portion of the great Northwest where agricultural pursuits might be engaged in and thus render possible a means of subsistence in future. While the work of civilizing and christianizing these benighted souls is greatly hindered because of the lack of food and necessities of life, yet Mr. and Mrs. Stevens have been instrumental in sowing good seed and witnessing cheering results in many instances among the Indians.

After Fifty Years Two Brothers Met Unexpectedly at Roland.

There was a rather unusual meeting on the platform of the railway station in the little town of Roland a few days ago, when two brothers named Barr, aged 71 and 78 respectively, looked into each other's faces for the first time in half a century.
Over fifty years ago the younger of the two left England to seek a home and fortune among what was then the forests of Canada. He settled near Meaford, Ont., married, and raised a family there.
The elder brother emigrated direct from England to Winnipeg a number of years ago.
The younger brother came out on one of the excursions last week to visit his daughter, Mrs. J. Bowes. The elder one came from Winnipeg on Monday, and the two met at the station.
Time had made great changes, and the freshness of early manhood had disappeared, both being grey-haired old men, so they had to be introduced to each other. The meeting was very effecting. They stood for a minute and neither moved nor spoke; then they stepped forward and clasped hands, while the tears rolled down their cheeks.
Spectators were affected, and turned away at the sight. At last each could speak the other's name, and finally they went away arm in arm to visit their friends together, where they set up far into the night recalling scenes of their boyhood days and singing old familiar hymns they used to sing in the days of long ago. They sat together for their photographs on the following day.—Witness.

Lord Strathcona Returns.

Lord and Lady Strathcona arrived in Montreal Sunday, having come over on the Campania for the express purpose of being in Canada during the royal visit.

In touching upon the war, Lord Strathcona blamed Oom Paul for its length, but declared that Britain would fight to the end. He ridiculed the story that the Czar intended to intervene. There could be no interference, he said, with England's well-defined policy in South Africa. Nor did he place any credence in the report that Lord Salisbury intended to retire from public life. The English Premier, when he saw him recently, was in good health and full of vigour, and he did not anticipate his early retirement.

Lord Strathcona smiled when asked regarding the report that he intended to resign as Canadian High Commissioner in London.
"I am still High Commissioner," he said, "and am striving to do my best for Canada and the Empire."
Lord Strathcona declared himself to be more than ever convinced that a Canadian fast line over the Atlantic would contribute more than any other project to the welfare of the Dominion. He believed that the passage between Canada and England could be made in four days at least, and if such a service was once established, there would be no end to its possibilities.

On Tuesday of last week Mr. J. H. Davidson, a gardener of Mt. Forest, was in Durham, and while delivering goods to a customer his team took fright and ran away. In their mad career they ran over Saml. T. Orchard, an old man nearly 80 years of age and father of S. T. Orchard, of Holstein, inflicting terrible injuries about the head, from which the old gentleman has since died. One of the horses had a leg broken and had to be killed.

A Relic.
On Wednesday of last week Mr. Wm. Jackson, of this village, handed us a copy of the New York Herald, of Saturday, April 15, 1865, the issue announcing the assassination of President Lincoln. The American war was then in full swing, and the paper which is over 35 years old and in good condition is a deeply interesting relic.

Drowned in Cistern.
Shortly after 6 o'clock Monday evening last when W. J. Stephens, grocer and family returned home they were horrified by finding Mrs. Stephens' sister, Mrs. Mary A. Brown, drowned in the cistern. The body was cold in death, though she had been seen about the house as usual by a neighbor about an hour and a half previously. Deceased lost her husband in Chicago, where they resided several years ago, and some time later had a stroke of paralysis which affected her brain from which she never fully recovered. She had been living here with her sister for some five years. An inquest was held Tuesday morning under Coroner Cameron, of Owen Sound, the jury returning a verdict of death by drowning, there being no evidence to indicate anything other than by accident. The cistern was under cover and the family procured the water by dipping it up with a pail through an opening. There was over five feet of water in it at the time of the sad event. Deceased was 35 years old and leaves one child, a son of ten years. The funeral took place Wednesday a. m. to the public cemetery, Rev. Mr. Newell officiating.
