A Modern Mountebank.
Rev. Joseph F. Berry, General Secretary Epworth League of the Methodist Episcopal Church and editor of the Epworth Herald, Chicago, says:—
We have received letters from time to time during the past five years inquiring about one John Alexander Dowie and his "Zion." To the inquirers we have replied that we knew nothing of Mr. Dowie personally, but that he had no stand among the Christian ministers of Chicago. Two recent letters, more urgent in character than usual, led us to attend Zion Tabernacle on last Sunday morning to see if we could make some estimate of his character, spirit, and public teachings.
On our way down Michigan Avenue we dropped in at "Zion." This is a great eight-story building, resembling one of the high-class hotels of the city. It is not a hotel, though it is conducted much like one. For it is a sanitarium, for medicine and surgery are both denounced as of the devil. Further down the avenue we passed the "Zion" Bank, "Zion" College, and "Zion" Investment Association, with some other departments of the peculiar institution.
The Tabernacle is also situated on Michigan Avenue, and is one of the best districts of the South Side. It was formerly a Unitarian church, and the inside has been re-arranged to accommodate a congregation of two thousand or more. As we reached the church a magnificent carriage, drawn by two well-groomed horses, was driven up to the curb. A gentleman arrayed in a full dress suit, and having the appearance of a slick, well-fed, well-to-do capitalist stepped out. It was Mr. Dowie. He is under medium height, has broad shoulders, is corpulent, has a bald head with a fringe of black hair behind his ears, and long gray whiskers. He greeted several persons warmly, looked inquiringly at the group of strangers who stood on the walk, and passed into the church.
The service was announced for 11 o'clock, but it was nearly half an hour later when Mr. Dowie, partly covered by a black gown, walked upon the platform. Seated on either side of the pulpit were the elders and deacons, and behind was the surplised choir, made up of people of all ages. There was some further waiting and we had an opportunity to study the congregation. There were perhaps 400 persons present. Here and there a bright face. Most of the faces, however, were vacant and dull. We have never seen 400 persons together whose appearance indicated a lower average of intelligence.
Mr. Dowie now arose, and in a shrill, piping voice, and with a decided English accent, gave out a hymn. It was sung heartily. Then the preacher read the scriptures. He continued to do so for nearly an hour. The reading was interspersed with a rambling commentary. This commentary was exceedingly primary in character. It was also shocking in its irreverence. But the people laughed at the speaker's funny sallies, and seemed to enjoy it immensely. Then he launched out into a discussion of some of his special hobbies. His voice soon rose to a scream. He walked up and down the big platform. He stamped his feet. He waved his arms until his gown threatened to fall off. The half-hour of vituperation which followed was probably never outdone by human lips. He denounced churches, secret societies and hogs. This greatly delighted the congregation. The people laughed and said: "That's so!" His hatred of the Methodist Episcopal Church seemed to be especially strong. It's bishops, he declared, are all gone to the devil, and are in league with hell. Bishop Thoburn seems to be particularly obnoxious to Mr. Dowie. The bishop, he said, was now reaping the fruits of his alliance with the devil. He is himself a wreck, and only recently he had lost a son—a direct judgment of the Almighty. He ridiculed Methodist revivals, and grew red in the face as he gave statistics showing the decline of that apostate church. He hissed his denunciation through his teeth. He clonched his fists. He laughed derisively. He screamed out his hatred. We had heard of these paroxysms, but did not believe it possible for a human being to so conduct himself in the name of the Christ of charity and good-will. And the saddest thing about it was that the elders and the deacons and the people seemed to really enjoy the tirade. There was an utter absence of the spirit of worship. Indeed, this bombastic and vituperative old man so emphasized and exalted himself that he seemed to absorb the attention and the admiration of his hearers.
And yet this is the man upon whom intelligent Methodist Christians write us and ask our opinion whether or not they would better visit his "Zion." We have nothing at this time to say about his methods, or about his alleged healing of the sick at his "Zion." We do say, however, that if anyone has been cured of disease (and God is

healing people all the time in answer to their prayer) it has been in spite of this egotistical mountebank, and not because of him. Dowie is a crafty man. His eye is winning. His speech is insinuating. He possesses in a remarkable degree those elements of leadership which attract the simple-minded and ignorant. Like the Mormons he mixes much truth with his error. Certain of the doctrines which he makes prominent are very attractive to the trustful, pure-minded Christian. He is an absolute autocrat. He rules Zion with a high hand. He is a born money-maker. We are not surprised, therefore, that he has temporary influence among the class of people from whom the majority of his converts have been made. But how intelligent people can be deceived by his bombastic assumptions and allow themselves to come under the spell of his hypnotic influence is a problem too deep for our comprehension.
