INHABITANTS OF ST. PIERRE DO A BIG BUSINESS.

Liquors and Opium Carried To and From Port With Impunity

The greatest smuggling centre on the face of the earth to-day is St. Pierre, the French colony off. the south coast of Newfoundland. It is the centre of an admirably organ-ized system of illicit trading.
