**Upper Canada Bible Society.**

The annual meeting of the Markdale Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society was held last Wednesday in the Anglican Church. The meeting was opened with devotional exercises led by the President, Rev. J. R. Newell, who afterwards addressed the meeting, and called on Rev. W. G. Reilly, of Chatsworth, the district agent, who delivered an able address in which he showed conclusively that the success of the missionary efforts of all denominations depends on the work of this British and Foreign Bible Society in its great work of having the Scriptures published in the various languages. Last year the issues of Scriptures was over 4,014,000. The bible is issued in over 600 languages. The aim of this Society is to give the Bible to all people in their own language. Revs. Buchanan, Hunter and Sparling spoke briefly, and decided to devote a Sunday service to this important topic. Secretary, T. Boland read the minutes of the last meeting and gave his report, after which the following officers were elected: President, Rev. J. Hunter; Vice-Presidents, the other resident ministers; Secretary, T. Boland; Treasurer, J. H. Baines; Depositor, W. Turner; Committed, W. Turner, C. W. Rutledge, John Cunningham and D. E. Ellis. On Sunday evening the town ministers gave valuable and interesting information on the history, aims and work of this great Society and when the collectors have their part of the work completed it is expected that the amount raised here will be three or four times that of last year.

**The Crops of Ontario.**

The Ontario farmer has been hit pretty hard this season in the failure of farm crops. Official statistics based on reports of two thousand correspondents located in different parts of the province indicate a drop of eleven million dollars in the value of the yield of eight of the principal crops as compared with last year. The farmer, however, may find some consolation in the fact that while yields in grain are nearly all lower than last season, prices are, as a rule, higher. Hay, again, which has given a much larger yield than in 1900, is not much below last year in price. On the other hand hogs and horses are very much higher than a year ago, but this is offset again, in a measure, by the lower prices lately ruling for dairy products and the almost total failure in apples—a failure for which higher prices do not furnish sufficient compensation.
