The Crops of Ontario.

The Ontario farmer has been hit pretty hard this season in the failure of farm crops. Official statistics based on reports of two thousand correspondents located in different parts of the province indicate a drop of eleven million dollars in the value of the yield of eight of the principal crops as compared with last year. The farmer, however, may find some consolation in the fact that while vields in grain are nearly all lower than last season, prices are, as a rule, higher. Hay, again, which has given a much larger yield than in 1900, is not much below last year in price. On the other hand hogs and horses are very much higher than a year ago, but this is offset again, in a measure, by the lower prices lately ruling for dairy products and the almost total failure in applesa failure for which higher prices do not furnish sufficient compensation.


