A resolution from the Owen Sound council, asking that the same lands be not detached, was also referred to the same commit-

Mr. John McDonald tendered his resignation as arbitrator under by-law This, too, was sent to the Memorials committee.

What Is Anarchy?

A very interesting paper was read by Rev. Dr. Workman to the Ministerial Association last Monday morning in Toronto, on Anarchy. The word, he savs. means lack of Government | It is a disregard of the government of law.

The Government of France was Anarchistic in its attitude towards the Drevfus case. Great Britain's unjust treatment of Ireland and her refusal to arbitrate in the Venezuela case was distinctly Anarchistic.

The Jameson raid, Great Britain's threat to take possession of Venezuela, the subjugation of the Philippines by the United States, the smashing of Spain, all were Anarchy, continued Dr. Workman. Any man who takes what does not belong to him by moral right or shields himself behind an unjust law is an Anarchist.


The deceiving of assessors, cheating in business, stock jobbing-all kinds of dishonesty is Anarchy.

Referring to the Canadian Government, he said that the Pacific Railway scandal. the gerrymandering of ridings, or any interfering with the will of the electorate were distinctly Anarchy.

Corporations such as the Standard Oil Company, who interfere with the rights of their employes, organized labor that threatens the liberty of nonunion men, whoever countenance violence or oppression are Anarchists,

The fundamental cause is selfishness. the love of power and indulgence, the desire to do as we please, come may. And under this category we can spend it to best advantage with us must class absolute monarchy and all unconstitutional government, the hereditary rulers of England, in Canada the tyranny of party government and imperfect laws.

"The cure must be by education as to natural and universal law, and by all means let us deal constitutionally. Wo cannot supress Anarchy by robbing men of their natural rights. The only absolute cure for Anarchy is monarchy Mr. Fred Walker, who has been fire the monarchy of Christ and His law.
