Dear Sirs.—This is to certify that we have examined the accounts and receipts and disbursements in connection with the McLaughlin Park and Balm Beach Summer Resort, for the season of 1901.

The receipts and disbursements include the ferry boat service, restaurant, store, ice cream parlors, theatre, and athletic grounds.  
Total receipts, \$18,771.69; disbursements, \$8,280.23; and show a net profit of \$8,491.47, which represents a dividend of over 15 per cent on a capital of \$55,000.

Mr. Pat Gillan's two nephews, the Messrs. Wicklow, from the States, arrived to see their mother and friends, whom they haven't seen for a number of years.

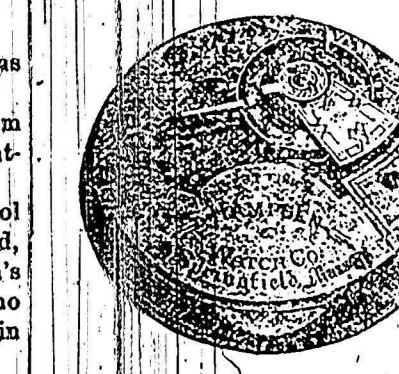
