The Canadian canal at Sault Ste. Marie was open for navigation for 246 days last season as compared with 238 days in the season of 1900. The number of vessels which passed through the canal in that period from April to December was 4,204, an increase of 1,123 over the previous season. The vessel tonnage amounted to 2,449,748 tons, or 255,000 tons more than in 1900. The freight tonnage aggregated 2,820,433 tons, being an increase of 784,717 tons.
