A Gigantic Summer Hotel.

Within two weeks contractor Alex. Green will commence the construction at Balmy Beach, Owen Sound, of the largest summer hotel in the Georgian Bay district, and one of the largest in the Dominion of Canada. When the ground is broken twenty-five builders will be set to work, and as the monster building progresses towards completion the staff will be increased until seventy-five or one hundred mechanics will get to work over the rising rafters. The contract is a large one involving the expenditure of nearly forty thousand dollars, and must be ready for its south guests by the first of June. From an architectural standpoint the building will be one of the most beautiful in this part of the province. It will be a larger building than any in Owen Sound or vicinity, with the exception of the largest factories. In company with several of the directors and the manager of the Owen Sound, Georgian Bay, and Sunnser Resort Company, I looked over the plans at Architect Foster's office. The general appearance of the building judging from the elevation of the plans, will be quite striking, and the large building with its lofty tower, white, with its tinted outlines and reddish roof will form a beautiful picture, silhouetted against the background of green foliage and blue sky. The striking feature of the building will be the large tower which rises from the south side of the rotunda entrance to a height of one hundred and eight feet, or about as high as the Canadian Pacific Railway elevators. The tower will be twenty feet square with an observatory at the top capped by a Turkish dome, which will be ornamented with the attractive adornments of that style of architecture. The building will be three hundred feet in length and the central portion will be four storeys high. There will be about sixty plate glass windows in the front part of the building and on every storey are picture attractive louvered alcoves. The rotunda will be nearly fifty feet square. The building will be constructed of wood throughout, but will be given a general appearance of solidity by the immense pillars which will support the grand piazza and extend through the rotunda and dining halls. An annex will extend westward from the main building, for the accommodation of the staff and bedrooms for the guests. The hotel will face a lawn and flower garden which will be made as attractive as money and the talents and experience of the landscaper gardener can make it. In the annex will be the kitchen, refrigerators, cold storage, appliances, and nurse's dining room for the children. Private dining rooms will be a novelty in this hotel, and three are arranged for in the plans. Facing the north and south will be balconies from the second storey, and at the rear of the rotunda a large balcony will face a bowing green and lawn tennis court where the guests can exercise themselves. In case the weather should turn chilly three large furnaces will be installed to heat the building. A large fountain will be the central feature of the lawn, where it will play the water and supply an aquarium in the basin below. The dining hall will probably be used extensively as a ball room, since it is seventy feet long and fifty feet wide. Naturally where a building of such immensity is to be constructed the arrangements for adequate fire protection will be of high order. A steam pumping plant will be installed and hose will be ready for instant use in every hall. Two large reservoirs will be always filled to meet any demand upon them. In addition to this an extensive system of fire escapes will be provided, making the loss of life through fire nearly impossible. The building will be so constructed that the addition of a three story annex can be made when desired. If the business of the first season is satisfactory this annex will be constructed, the importance to Owen Sound of having two hundred wealthy guests for three or four months of the year cannot be over-rated. Goderick saw fit to grant a large loan and extensive concessions to a summer hotel company, and Owen Sound is to be congratulated that the big concern will not cost the corporation a cent, but will in fact add materially to the assessment of the wealthy little township of Saugeen. A gratifying feature of the enterprise is that several applications for large blocks have been received by outside fraternal societies, who desire to invest their surplus in the preferred stock.
