community. Some Interesting Facts.

In his sermon last Sunday evening at Christ Church the Rev. Mr. Newell patronage accorded our predecessor said that from the year 1800, on through and that of as many others as may the entire 19th century, the British Empire had increased in dimensions at the rate of two acres every second. With every tick of the clock the Empire has expanded by that exact area, and the process has run on day and night, through summer and winter, peace and war, through the whole hundred years. During the century the British Empire has added to its area, in a word, three countries like the United States, or forty-five countries like Germany, or fifty Spains, or ninety Italies. In 1814 the population of the Empire was 61,000,000; to-day the population is 400,000,000 nearly one-third of the inhabitants of the world. At the beginning of the century there were 50 missionaries in foreign service; to-day there are 15,000. There was not a native preacher at the beginning of the century; now there are 65,000 native workers. The native christians at the beginning of the century did not number 10,000; now there are 1,500,000, and they are increasing every day. In 1799 the Church Missionary Society was founded, with an annual income of 912 pounds. In 1899 the income was \$1,900,000. Ten years ago there was but one English church in Uganda; to-day there are 700. Ten years ago there were scarce 300 baptized persons connected with the Church; now there are 30,000.
