The Municipal council of the township of Artemesia met in the town hall, Flesherton, on Monday, April 14th. Members all present, the rever. in the chair. Minutes of February session read and confirmed.

Communications as follows were presented and read, viz.: Thos. Sullivan and others, a petition asking council to expend \$200 on the townline, Artemesia and Glenelg from con. & N.D.R. to lot 112, G. S. W.; committee on treasurer's securities report the securities were satisfactory; Adam Hislop, notice of a ditch near his farm being out of repair; A. O. Hogg, inquiry as to dates of meetings of Council; the clerk of Proteston, an account for one half of gravel used on town line, \$3.40; John Whitten, an account for work done on assessment roll, 1902; P. Sullivan, an account of \$6.00 for opening saw road on town line, Artemesia and Glenelg; J. A. Williams, an account for repairs to scrapers and drills, \$2.25; Jane Thompson, an account for bread furnished Mrs. Morrow, 35.00; the rever. for wood furnished Thos. Manders and Mrs. Morrow, as ordered by council, \$7.80; the trustees of S. S. No. 17 applied for the issue of debentures for the purpose of building a school house in said sections.

By-law 607, to authorize the borrowing of \$2500 at such times and in such sums as shall be required to meet the current expenses of 1902, was introduced and read a first and second time, and council went into committee of the whole on by-laws 606 and 607, Mr. Boyd in the chair.

Mr. Boyd presented by-laws 606 and 607 as filled up in committee of the whole.

Muir-Gibson—That by-laws 606, to appoint municipal officers for 1902, and 607 to authorize the borrowing of the sum of \$2500, for current expenses as filled up in committee, be now read a third time, signed, sealed and entered in by-law book.—Carried.

Boyd-Thompson—That the rever. be reimbursed \$7.80, being amount paid by him for wood to T. Manders and Mrs. Morrow, during the winter, as per resolution of this council.—Carried.

Thompson-Boyd—That Proteston council be paid \$3.40, being one-half of gravel hill on townline, A. and P.—Carried.

Gibson-Muir—That J. A. Williams' account of \$2.25 for tempering drills and repairing scrapers be paid.—Carried.

Boyd-Thompson—That the petition of Thos. Sullivan and others asking grant on townline, A. and G., be referred to Messrs. Muir and Gibson to confer with commissioner of Glenelg in the matter.—Carried.

Gibson-Muir—That the treasurer is hereby authorized to accept \$18.00 in full of taxes on property of the late Dr. Pridy in the town of Eugenia.—Carried.

Thompson-Muir—That in regard to complaint of Henry Fenwick as to fence on West street, Eugenia, the clerk notify Mr. W. H. Duckart to remove his fence off said street at once.—Carried.

Gibson-Boyd—That in regard to complaint of police trustees of Flesherton the clerk notify F. G. Karstedt to at once remove fence placed by him across Hill street, Flesherton.—Carried.

Boyd-Thompson—That the clerk advertise the closing of the following roads: Deviation between lots 24 and 25, con. 12, 13, and deviation between 0 and 10 concessions, from lot 21 to 35, inclusive.—Carried.

Muir-Gibson—That the report of committee re treasurer's securities be received and filed.—Carried.

Council adjourned.—Advance.
