

FRESHERTON HAPPENINGS

On Wednesday of last week there was a funeral at the home of Eugene Williams, sr., one of the earliest settlers in Ardenesia township. His funeral which was under the auspices of the Orange Order was largely attended and took place on Friday last at the Salem cemetery where his remains were laid alongside his wife who preceded him a few years ago. His funeral was conducted by Rev. L. W. Thom, officiated and also conducted an appropriate memorial service in the Presbyterian Church, Engenia, on Sabbath morning last. Deceased was 81 years of age and is survived by seven sons, six of whom bore his remains to the grave, and two daughters.

The annual convention of the Episcopalian Church of the Holy Trinity, held at the residence of Rev. W. Buchanan, was held on Wednesday last. The following officers were present: Hon. President, Rev. J. A. McLaren, D.D., President, Rev. C. W. Reynolds, Sec. T. Gilray. The opening exercises were conducted by Rev. W. Buchanan, Rev. C. W. Reynolds leading in prayer. The President then addressed the convention for a short time and called on the Secretary to read the minutes of last session which on being read were on motion adopted. "What can the S. The subject was discussed by Rev. T. R. White, Rev. J. F. McLaren, D.D., Rev. W. Buchanan, Mr. Pickell and Mr. J. Campin. The discussion was closed by the following resolution being made and carried unanimously: Moved by Rev. T. R. White, seconded by Rev. W. Buchanan, "That this convention approves of the principal of Prohibition and that we will do our best to secure a large vote for Prohibition. Carried. The subject of "Connected v. Disconnected S. S. Lessons" was taken up by the president, Rev. C. W. Reynolds, who gave a very able address on the topic. It was ably discussed by Rev. Wm. Buchanan and Mr. W. G. Pickell. The discussion was closed by Rev. J. F. McLaren, D.D., in an able address. "Home Training for the S. S." was taken up by Rev. W. Buchanan, who gave a very interesting address on the subject, showing the great need of Christian home training and that it was necessary to commence in early childhood to train the child. The subject was discussed by Messrs. Pickell and Richardson, Rev. T. R. White, J. Campin, Rev. C. W. Reynolds, and J. Lougheed. "Teacher's Study of the Bible," which was assigned to Rev. J. S. Davidson, the Rev. gentleman not being present the subject was introduced by Rev. J. F. McLaren in a very able address. Discussion was taken part in by W. G. Pickell, Rev. C. W. Reynolds, Rev. W. Buchanan, Rev. T. R. White and Rev. Mr. Cobourn. Collection was then taken, amounting to \$1.50. The afternoon session was then closed by singing and the pronouncing of the benediction by Rev. Mr. Cobourn.

physicians and all drugs as allies of the devil, he has brought about him hundreds of invalids, some of them bringing with them considerable sums of money. Two weeks ago his only daughter, Ester, was terribly burned by flames resulting from the overturning of an alcohol lamp. Her wounds were dressed by one of Dowie's elders, after which the General Overseer and his chief men spent the whole day in prayers about her bedside. At nightfall the young woman was suffering terrible agony, and at last parental love overcame the scruples of her father, and he sent for one of the despised physicians. The physician who responded says that from the first there could have been no hope of Miss Dowie's recovery. She died during the evening. And now the thousands who actually look upon the gray-bearded Scotch-Australian as more than human, and have listened to his terrible denunciations of medical men as words inspired, are asking what they shall think of his own act of heresy in the hour of personal distress. Dowie himself slipped off to his summer home leaving behind him his apostles and a number of phonographic records of his own "inspired speech," to which 5,000 followers gathered in the Chicago Auditorium on Sunday afternoon, listened midway between awe and incredulity. Within recent months Dowie and his great religious business enterprises he has built up have received several other severe shocks. By a court decision he was forced to pay more than \$100,000 to an English manufacturer he had persuaded to take up his residence in the holy city of "Zion," located forty miles south of Chicago, on the shore of Lake Michigan, and more recently there was a severe outbreak of smallpox in the Divine Healing College which he has established in Michigan Avenue. Whatever the outcome of the present crisis, it is certain that Dowie and the strange and fanatic following he has built up in ten years are worthy of the serious study of sociologists.

Dowie's Crisis.
"Dr." John Alexander Dowie, self-acclaimed reincarnation of the Prophet Elijah, banker and publisher, divine healer and absolute owner of a town with more than 4,000 residents, General Overseer of the Ostiole Church in Zion, lace manufacturer and Ohron in Zion, lace manufacturer and founder and head of the Theocratic party, former Presbyterian preacher, and present millionaire, who is said to draw regularly every week one-tenth of the total income of more than thirty thousand families in the United States and other parts of the world, has apparently reached a crisis in his career, which has so far been a remarkable demonstration of the power possible to a man who combines shrewd business methods with the industry and perseverance of a religious fanatic. The cardinals and bishops of the Roman Catholic Church have been heard to say that Dowie is a man of great power and influence, and that his teachings are of a nature to attract thousands of converts to his cause.
