Sanford in the Well.

The most thrilling event chronicled for many a day was that of the man in the well. Joshua Sanford, of Paris, Ont., 30 years of age, was boring for water at the bottom of a well 80 feet deep. Something went wrong with the brick casing and immediately the bottom gave way owing to quicksand and he sprang into the bucket but before reaching half way up was buried and for 100 hours lived in this predicament, but with almost superhuman efforts day and night was released and brought to the surface alive and conscious after being entombed 100 hours, but the shock is likely to prove fatal, as his nervous system is a wreck.

A Better Way.

County Roads.

The complacency with which the general public endure the discomforts and losses entailed by bad roads at certain seasons of the year is remarkable. They may be willing to expend money in other enterprises from which a more direct financial return is realized, but the payment of a few dollars in extra taxes to improve the highways is opposed on the score of economy. Municipal officers are often blamed for their neglect in this matter; the fault, however, does not lay primarily with them and their failure to act cannot be attributed to ignorance of the necessities of the case. They dread the odium of increasing the tax rate and the charge of extravagance that would be sure to coat them their position at the next election. The result is a haphazard system of patching which never accomplishes anything permanent. In many cases the transfer of the old toll roads to the municipalities has meant a steady deterioration of their condition. Provincial Instructor Campbell in addressing the Grey County Council at Owen Sound last week estimated that the county had spent half a million dollars in moneys and labour on their roads, reckoning labour at only fifty cents a day, and all they had to show for it was a few stretches of good roaded on the main highways and a very indifferent quality of roads through the townships generally. In other countries the condition is much the same and must remain so until the people are aroused to the necessity for reform and adopt some systematic and business-like method of constructing and maintaining their highways. If, as Mr. Campbell suggests, a commission were appointed by each county to take charge of the leading roads and a complete outfit of machinery provided for its use a start would be made whereby to demonstrate what he accomplished by well-directed

James Struthers Dead.

The 11th line Euphrasia has by the death of Mr. James Struthers, J.P., lost one of its oldest and most respected inhabitants. He died on Sunday morning the 28th June. All the members of his family were able to be present at the closing hours when he passed peacefully away. Mr. Struthers was born in Argyleshire, Scotland, but left the northern country in infancy, and with his father spent his youth farming in Avondale and on the estate of the late Sir John Heron Maxwell, of Springkell. He came to this country highly recommended by Sir John and bearing testimonials from the minister of the U.S. Legation in London. He had also certificates of an unblemished character. He came to Toronto when 29; farmed at Forks Mills and in Scarborough for nearly ten years; and finally removed to Euphrasia where he married Elizabeth Shears and settled on the farm on which he lived for forty years and where the end took place at the age of 79. In 1879 he was made a Justice of the Peace for which his shrewdness, caution, and love of honour and peace well fitted him. He was a man of sterling worth, kind and hospitable, and esteemed by a wide circle of acquaintances. He will be much missed by his family to whom he was especially attached, and the sympathy of the entire community is extended to his widow and children. A useful, upright and honorable life was thus brought to a close. His remains were interred in Markdale Public Cemetery on the 2nd July. Upwards of seventy vehicles followed the remains to the grave. The service at the house was conducted by Rev. John Hunter, of Markdale Presbyterian Church.—Com.
