The 11th line Euphrasia has by the death of Mr. James Struthers, J.P., lost one of its oldest and most respected inhabitants. He died on Sunday morning the 29th June. Mr. Struthers was born in Argyleshire, Scotland, but left the northern country in infancy, ties of the case.
