## Western Fair, London.

This year Canada's favorite exhibition will be held from September 15th to 20th, a week later than last year, and following both the Ottawa and Toronto shows.

Every successive year the managers of the Western Fair make a move forward, and this year will be no exception in this regard. Preparations are being made which will keep the old "Western" well to the front as the most successful as well as the leading Live Stock and Agricultural Show of the Dominion. Now and interesting features are being introduced for the first time. Some important changes will be made in the arrangement of exhibits in the main building, as well as in other departments.

This year will see the introduction in the Art Gallery of many works of art of high merit, by the leading artists of the country. A large exhibit is assured in consequence of an improvement in the premiums-in that department; artists of note have already signified their intention of exhibiting.

It is confidently expected that the Machinery and Agricultural Implement Departments will be well filled, some of the largest manufacturers of the United States have made application for space which has been allotted them. A number of Canadian manufacturers are also anxious to exhibit. Doubtless the growing agricultural wealth of our country offers great inducements to the manufacturing concerns across the line.

Last year's unparalleled success in the Live Stock Departments will no doubt be repeated. Exhibits in the various classes that buildings erected for other purposes had to be turned into stalls, as well as accommodation provided outside the grounds. The prospects of good crops throughout Ontario should tend to make the Western Fair of 1902 equal to any that has been, as regards the products of both farm and dairy.

It is somewhat early to refer to two special attractions, but we are assured that the management have already secured some thrilling and highly sensational acrobatic features, and the list is far from being complete yet, a full list will be advertised in this paper later on.

As is usual at this time each year, the office staff are busily engaged in mailing prize lists and other advertising matter throughout the Province. The Secretary informs us that he will be pleased to mail lists to anyone making application. A copy of the newly revised Map of Western Ontario will also be mailed to any address. It is a most complete map, having a full marginal index, with railways and stations specially marked so that places can be easily found. The map has been copyrighted. Each school throughout Western Ontario has been furnished with a sufficient number to supply each room.

## Strange Bible Facts.

The learned Prince of Granada, heir to the Spanish throne, imprisoned by order of the Crown for fear he should aspire to the throne, was kept in solitary confinement in the prison at the Place of Skulle, Madrid. After thirty-three years in this living tomb, death came to his release, and the following remarkable researches taken from the bible, and marked with an old nail on the rough walls of his cell, told how the brain sought employment through the dreary years:

In the Bible the word Lord is found 1,838 times; the word Jehovah 6,855 times, and the word Beyerend but once, and that in the 9th verse of the 11th Psalm. The 8th verse of the 11th Psalm is the middle verse of the Bible. The 9th verse of the 8th chapter of Esther is the longest verse; 36th verse, 11th chapter of St. John is the shortest. In the 107th Psalm four verses are alike, the 8th, 15th, 21st and 31st. Each verse of the 136 Psalm ends alike. No names or words with more than six syllables are found in the Bible. The 37th chapter of Isaiah and 19th chapter of 2nd Kings are alike. The word girl occurs but once in the Bible, and that in the 3rd verse of the 3rd chapter of Joel. There are found in both books of the Bible 3,856,493 letters, 773,093 words, 31,273 verses, 1,189 chapters and 66 books. The 26th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles is the finest chapter to read. The most beautiful chapter in the Bible is the 23rd Psalm. The four most inspiring promises are John the 14th chapter and 2nd verse; John the 6th chapter and 37th verse; St. Matthew 11th chapter and 28th verse, and the 57th Psalm, 4th verse. The 1st verse of the 60th chapter of Isaiah is the one for the new convert. All who flatter themselves with vain boasts of their perfectness should learn the 6th chapter of St. Matthew. All humanity should learn the 6th chapter of St. Luke, from the 20th verse to its ending.


