To MEMBERS: The management have much pleasure in presenting the Annual Statement for the year 1901.

It is gratifying to know that there has been a large increase in the volume of business transacted by the Company.

Cash paid with drawing members amounted to \$518,355.37. This has reduced the liabilities of the Company on old stock, which has been replaced by new at a lower rate of interest and more advantageous terms to the Company.

The assets have been increased by \$280,337.37, and now stand at \$1,282,808.26. \$5,000.00 has been transferred to the Reserve Fund.

That the Company continues to grow in popularity is evinced by the new business written, which was larger in amount than in any previous year.

Our investment in land suitable for building purposes has proved very satisfactory. These purchases were made when the depression was at its lowest point and real estate was unsaleable.

The Real Estate stands in the Assets at its actual cost, and not at the real market value.

The management hope by the diligent exercise of carefulness, foresight and economy in conducting the business of the Company to realize for its great membership an enduring success.
