Selecting the Site.

The committee appointed by the County Council to select a site for the proposed House of Refuge, and report, started out to-day and will spend the balance of the week in inspecting the different properties offered. The committee comprises Messrs. Gordon, Agnew, Harness, Shute, Preston, McKinnon, McLenn, McArthur and Allan. The first place to be visited is Durham, where there are about half a dozen supposedly eligible properties offered. From there the committee go to Markdale, where there are five properties slated for the House of Refuge purposes; thence to Thornbury, at which point there are four properties in the market. Then comes Meaford with half a dozen offerings, and finally Owen Sound with fourteen properties.—O. S. Sun.

Death of Dr. Horsey, M. P.

The promising life of Dr. E. H. Horsey, M. P., of Owen Sound, was cut short on Wednesday evening of last week by a tragic and distressing accident. He was struck by a fragment from a bursting fly-wheel in the Sun Portland Cement Works, and although he lingered for a few hours it was known from the first that there was no possible chance of saving his life.

Dr. Horsey had been the originator and principal stockholder of the Sun Portland Cement Works, and his efforts and enthusiasm were remarked a few days ago, when the whole plant started operation in a satisfactory manner. Since then Dr. Horsey had been at the works almost unceasingly, visiting the various departments. Late in the afternoon Mr. W. P. Telford, a local banker and a director of the cement company, visited the works for the purpose of seeing the plant in operation, and was being shown around by Dr. Horsey.

About six o'clock they entered the engine building. In this building is a ponderous engine of 650 nominal horse power, on which is a monster fly-wheel about twenty feet in diameter. From this extend heavy driving ropes, by which the power is conducted to the machinery in the other buildings. Just south of this large fly-wheel is a small auxiliary engine, on which are two fly-wheels, each about four feet in diameter. This little engine was used for turning the rotaries and other machines of a subsidiary character. Dr. Horsey stood about four feet from this engine, and on his left was Mr. Telford. They were talking to each other. Dr. Horsey turned to the chief engineer, Mr. M. Smith, and instructed him to start the

big engine at 9 o'clock. Mr. Smith then went over to the small engine to shut off the power. Engineer W. Webb had just entered for night duty. Engineer Smith was in the act of turning off the power, and Dr. Horsey, who had suddenly spoken to Mr. Telford, and turned to speak to Mr. Telford, when suddenly the revolving fly-wheel on the small engine burst into fragments, a piece striking Dr. Horsey on the head, fracturing the skull. Drs. Lang and Hershey were summoned by telephone, and the unfortunate man, breathing with difficulty, was removed to the hospital, where he expired about midnight.

Mrs. Horsey and her two children were in Wingham at the time visiting her father.

Dr. W. E. Horsey was born at Kingston, March 7th, 1857. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry E. Horsey, who now reside at Ottawa. He graduated in medicine from Queen's University, and coming to Owen Sound in 1885 took up the practice of his profession. In 1891, while yet a young man, his ability as a public speaker brought him prominently before the Liberals in North Grey, and here received the nomination in a hard-fought battle against the Conservative candidate, Judge Klason. He was defeated. Later he accepted the appointment of medical examiner for the Sun Life Insurance Company, and from that was appointed a special agency, covering China and other Oriental countries. He was very successful and amassed considerable wealth in the East. About three years ago he returned to Owen Sound, and in 1900 was the unanimous choice of the Liberal party in the last general contest for the Dominion House. He carried the seat over Mr. Charles Gordon, Conservative, by a majority of 19. In the House of Commons he was the originator of the Victoria Day Bill, and was congratulated on his initial address in the House by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Mrs. Horsey is a daughter of Dr. P. McDonald, M. P., for East Huron, and Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons.

THE FUNERAL.

The funeral took place Friday. Business was suspended for the afternoon, and the people of the town paid a last tribute of respect and friendship to the late Dr. Horsey. Service was held at the family residence at 3.30, and at 4 o'clock the cortege, the largest in the history of Owen Sound, moved off to Greenwood cemetery.

Expressions of sympathy were received from all sides, and poured in over the wires from all parts of Canada.

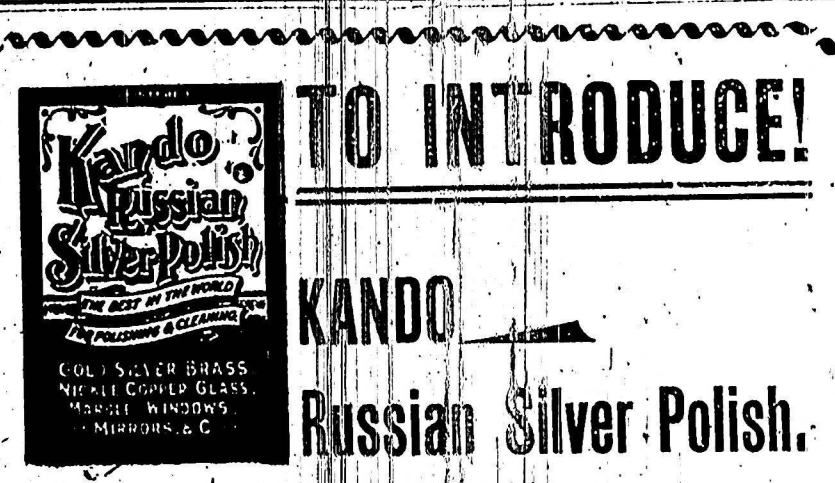
