Ho For Balm Beach.

The Great Gorge Electric Railway.
The most wonderful piece of engineering of the nineteenth century is the Gorge Electric Railway which runs alongside of the Niagara River from Lewiston to Niagara Falls and takes in all the places of interest on the historic river. This is the route the I.O.O.F. excursion takes on Wednesday, August 13. Fare from Markdale only \$2.10, good for three days. Train leaves at 7 a.m. sharp.
Railway Development.
The Grand Trunk Railway authorities during the past few months have laid in sidings about \$30,000 worth of steel. A five mile siding was put in at Durham for the National Cement Company; two miles at Warton for the Warton West Sugar Company; five miles at Shallow Lake for the Portland Cement Company; two miles at Berlin for the Berlin Sugar Company, and 1 mile at Owen Sound for the Sun Portland Cement Company. The Canadian Pacific Railway Company have decided to rush the building of 1,000 box cars of 30 ton capacity. They will be built at the shops at Hochelega, and then sent out to the wheat fields.

A Credit to the Town.
Talk about up-to-date business places; you don't have to go to Toronto, or even to Owen Sound in order to see a decidedly up-to-date barber shop, just drop into Mr. James A. Crowston's magnificent parlors opposite the STANDARD office, Markdale. These premises were formerly used by Wm. Smith, late of Toronto, Mr. C. is certainly the front in his line. He moved last Friday into his new premises and is receiving the congratulations of his numerous customers and the public. Mr. Crowston came to Markdale six years ago this month and by close attention to business, frugal habits and courteous bearing has made a host of friends and customers. He richly deserves the success which has attended his well directed efforts, and his superior premises are creditable not only to himself but to the town. One thing he lacks, however, in order to be a complete citizen, but it is hoped he may not enjoy single blessedness another half dozen years.
