Ennis; Eugenia, Rev. W. N. Chantler; Eugenia, Rev. T. R. White and Mr. Baker; Flesherton, Rev. J. S. I. Wilson, Mr. W. Clayton; Dundalk, Rev. N. Wellwood and Mr. Gallagher; Corbiston, Rev. T. G. McAteer; O. Sound Woodford, Walters Falls and Pricerville were not represented by delegates. Revs. Wellwood, Rodwell, Chantler and Ferguson being new men on the district joined their brethren for the first time in business relative thereto. In the absence of Rev. Dr. Langford, Chairman of the District, Rev. N. Wellwood was appointed to preside and Rev. J. Power discharged the duties of secretary. Routine business included attention to the usual assessments and Missionary meetings. The latter was left with the pastors for local arrangements. A grant to Brookholm Mission was recommended.
