I wish to give STANDARD readers the result of a visit to the wheat fields of Manitoba as viewed to-day, Sept. 9th. Melita is situated 183 miles, from Winnipeg, and until reaching this point I must say that I was disappointed as regards the extent of the wheat The Rev. Dodds, who took me out for a drive in the morning to his 320 acre farm, which is located two miles from this place. In the afternoon he drove me another direction where he said he would show me a mile square of a wheat field. -I could look in every direction and stooks were standing thickly as far as the eye could see. I could distinctly see for five miles and there was nothing but stooks standing wife and three children.
