WITHIN HISTORIC

OLD PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS OF ONTARIO.

Legislation That Was Adopted in Old Pile-Stirring In-

cidents. In view of the sale of the old Par liament buildings on Front street, Toronto, and the early demolition of the historic pile a short review of the stirring time in which they were the storm center will prove of more than passing interest.

History of the greatest importance has been made within the old brick walls now doomed to destruction. Between the opening of the first Parliament in 1832 and the prorogation of the last that was held within its chamber many important questions have been settled. The struggle for responsible government ended in victory, the secularization of the clergy reserves was consummated under its roof, the bill being passed in the session of 1858, elections were thought to have been purified to a large degree; manhood suffrage had taken the place of the former restrictions of the franchise, education has made great striles; the country has developed marvellously, villages becoming towns and towns cities, and in place of fifeen assembled men elected for the first Upper Canada Parliament in 1792, the Provincial Legislature now consists of 98 members. WAS ONCE AN ASYLUM
