The next annual meeting of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union will be held at the Agricultural College, Guelph, Ontario, on Monday and Tuesday, December 8th and 9th, starting, at 1.30 p. m. on Monday. Reports will be presented and discussed on co-operative experiments conducted throughout Ontario, in Agriculture, Horticulture, Economic Botany, Poultry Raising and Forestry. As there were in all about 4,000 experimenters throughout Ontario in 1892. these reports should be very instruct-

Besides four general sessions, there will be two sessions on household economics, which will be specially interesting to the ladies. Fernow, Director of the New York State College of Forestry, Ithaca, N. Y.; Hon. John Dryden, Provincial Minister of Agriculture, Toronto; Dr. Jas. Mills, President of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph; W. J. Brown, Principal of the Canadian Correspondence College, Guelph, and
