FIVE MILLIONS INCREASE.

Figures Reveal How Canada's Trade Is Advancing.

An Ottawa despatch says :- An idea of the rapid rate at which the revenue of the Dominion has been increasing is found in the fact, that during the year 1895 the customs revenue was \$17,887,269, while, for the past six months it was \$18.026,-615, or \$139,346 more for the six months than for the whole of 1895. The revenue for the month of Docember was \$2,967,869, or \$398, 883 greater than for December, 1901: The revenue for the six months ending December was \$18,026,615 compared with \$15,864,692 (for same time in 1901, an increase \$2,161,923. The increase for current fiscal year will be in neighborhood of five millions.
