ASSIZE COURT.

Heavy Docket—Several Cases Not Heard.

His Lordship Mr. Justice MacMahon opened court about 3 p.m. on Tuesday March 10. In all there were fifteen civil and three criminal cases on the list.

Boyd v. Cameron.—An action for damages for slander brought by Geo. W. Boyd against A. J. Cameron. The case was withdrawn; both parties signed a document which was not filed, but it is understood they "broke even" and divided the costs.

McDonald v. McDonald, a claim for conversion of goods, was postponed. Lucas, Wright & McArdle for Plff.; MacKay and Sampson for Defs.

Little v. Mitchell.—An action for seduction, was tried out and judgment given for Defendant. Byens, Wright & McArdle for Plff.; Tucker & Cameron for Defs.

REX vs. MITCHELL.—A case which Bernard Mitchell was charged with committing rape upon Miss Mingle, daughter of a former hotel-keeper of Aytou. The case lasted all day Wednesday, and after a charge by the Trial Judge favorable to the prisoner, the Jury brought in a verdict of guilty. Mitchell was given 7 years in Kingston, Wardrobe, of Hamilton, for Crown; W. J. Hatton for Defence.

Trunk Railway Co. for damages resulting to him from a pitch in of trains near Berlin in September last. PRESBYTERY MEETS.

The Presbytery of Owen Sound met in Division Street hall on Tuesday, 3rd March, at 10 o'clock, and was opened with devotional exercises led by Mr. Matheson. Rev. Mr. Nelson, moderator, presided. Mr. Acheson reported for the committee on Mr. Manthorne's application to be received as a minister of the Presbyterian church.

The Sabbath School report was presented by Mr. McAlpine and adopted, provision being made for a visitation of every school in the Presbytery before November 1st.

Mr. McNab presented the Argumentation report, and grants were recommended as follows: Hepworth, \$180; Knox, Sydenham, \$90; Johnston, \$160; Markdale, \$50. Hepworth is required to raise \$4.50 per communicant for salary, to comply with the law of the church regarding grants.

An overture to the General Assembly was adopted, proposing that such changes be made in the regulations governing the administrations of the Aged and Infirm Minister's Fund as that all ministers permitted to retire shall participate in its benefits, and a committee was appointed to prepare an overture on similar lines regarding the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, with Mr. Eastman-Couyener.

Time was granted to Kilsyth congregation to sell their church with view of having it removed to make room for the new church on the same site.

Mr. Graham resigned the charge of Latona, and the congregation was cited to appear on the 17th March at 10 a.m. in Owen Sound, when the resignation will be finally disposed of.

A call was presented from Shoal Lake, Manitoba, to Mr. Davidson, salary \$1,000. Presbytery resolved to cite its congregation to appear on the 17th March in Owen Sound, when the call will be considered.

The following commissioners to the General Assembly were appointed: Messrs. Black, Simpson, Somerville and Thompson, ministers, and Messrs. D. A. Ferguson, Geo. Ptolemy, D. Smith and L. Sprague, elders.

Rev. Dr. Fletcher was nominated a moderator of the Assembly. Rev. Dr. Armstrong, was nominated as Professor of Theology in Presbyterian College, Halifax, and Rev. Dr. McLaren, of Rocklyn, to the vacancy in Presbyterian College, Montreal.

The committee appointed to visit Johnston, etc., in connection with the resignation of Mr. Smith, submitted in June last was discharged.

The notice of motion given by Dr. McRobbie that \$35 for travelling expenses of commissioners to the General Assembly be given this year was not adopted, so that the standing rule in the matter of travelling expenses continues in force.

The Home Mission Committee of Presbytery was instructed to consult with the authorities of the Methodist church with the view of exchanging Caven station for one of theirs contiguous to Johnston, should such an arrangement be practicable.

The Presbytery adjourned to meet in Division Street Hall, March 17th, at 10 a.m., and was closed with the benediction. J. Somerville, Clerk.

ARTEMESIA COUNCIL. The Municipal Council of the Township of Artemesia met in the town hall, Plesherton, on Monday, the 2nd day of March, A. D. 1903. The members were all present, the record in the Minutes of session of Feb. 2nd, 1903, were read and confirmed. The following communications were presented and read, viz.: The Farmer's Association, asking Council to pass a resolution regarding equal assessment of railways and corporation; A. Mc Cameron, regarding renewal of charter of the Huron and Ontario Railway Co.; Dr. Bryce, certificate of registration of births, marriages and deaths; Hart & Co., account \$3 for register; M. and D.; Wm. Davis, account for wood for hall, \$19.50.

By-laws No 24, to appoint municipal officers, and 25, to appoint road commissioners, were introduced and read a first and second time. By-law No. 26 was read a third time, and 24 was passed for completion until next meeting.

Gibson-Muir.—That the clerk be paid \$29.80, being registrar's fees 1902, as certified to by Dr. Bryce, Carried. McKenzie.—Best.—That the money reimbursed \$2.65, being amount advanced to him by Mrs. Allan for way fare. Gibson-Muir.—That owing to total disability of Fred Gee he be allowed ten dollars per month for six as at present.—Carried. Gibson-Muir.—That the account of John C. Wright, \$2 for tile, be paid. Carried.

Gibson-Muir.—That the account of Wm. Davis, wood for township \$19.50, be paid.—Carried. Muir.—McKenzie.—That \$150 be appropriated for putting crushed stone road leading to Plesherton station, of the limit of Plesherton, the trustees of Plesherton having appropriated \$400 within their limits, the Commissioner of Div. 3 has agreed to expend \$150 out of his appropriation on the same road, special grant and commission to be applied outside the village limits. Carried.

McKenzie.—Best.—That Mr. Richardson the representative of the South Riding of Grey in the House, be and is hereby requested to assist the Directors of the Ontario Electric Railway Company in obtaining an extension of their charter for which they are applying, approaching session of Parliament. Carried.

McKenzie.—Gibson.—That in the present condition of the laws agriculture has become an unequal burden on the farmer, and therefore urge that our representatives in parliament have the laws that the property of railways and public service corporations be assessed for the same as the property of individuals and taxation that be on a more equal basis, and that this resolution be carried. Carried. Esq., M.P.P.—Carried.
