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

There are several modern improvements on present conditions that Canada must have, and the indications are that they will be realized before many

1st-Rural Free Mail delivery; this has passed the experimental stage in the United States and is a success. Canada must get a move on. This

must come. graded and furnished efficiently, with and she was thrown violently to the vans for the conveyance of children to and from school. These have also been successful in the States. Such a school is to be established near Guelph as an experiment in Canada-this is a move in the right direction.

3rd-Rural Telephones, or the extension of telephone systems to farm houses at reasonable rates. This means the smashing of a monopoly, or else a great reduction in rates.

4th-The extension of the principle of Municipal Ownership. Municipalities should own their waterworks, electric light and telephone systems. This would mean cheap water, cheap light and obday power. These public utilities would then be worked in the interests of the people, and not in the interests of private individuals or wealthy and intolerant corporations. Some of the latter begin to think they own the country, and that the people live, move and have a being, simply to pour money into their coffers. They influence our Legislatures, and boss the politicians, and the common people lock on meekly and foot the bill.

Here are live questions for live politicians to handle. Has Canada any "men for the times?" If so, let them come to the front.
