## HOLLAND COUNCIL.

The Council met on Tuesday, March  
10th, for transaction of general town-  
ship business, members all present,  
Wm. Foster, Esq., reeve, in the chair.  
The minutes of meeting held February  
7th were read and signed.

The motion passed on 7th Feb. offering  
Mr. Walker \$20.00 per acre for  
land occupied by road was rescinded  
and the following substituted: That we offer Mr. Walker, without prejudice,  
the sum of \$20.00 per acre for land  
occupied by road, providing Glenelg  
is satisfied, and Mr. Walker furnishes  
a clear deed, free from all encumbrances,  
and pays cost of survey, etc., includ-  
ing plan of road.

The petition of Jas. Gillespie and  
other residents of Berkeley, praying  
for commutation of statute labor in  
Berkeley to 50c. per day, was granted  
and a by-law governing the same was  
passed.

The clerk was instructed to request  
the council of Sullivan to refund their  
share of \$21.50 expended on the Gar-  
fraz Road in 1902 by Wm. Hampton;  
also to notify Mr. Conn to pay to Mr.  
Murray before May 1st the sum of \$3  
for trees cut on 10th concession.

The following notice was ordered to be  
given one insertion in the Chats-  
worth News and the Markdale STAN-  
DARD: After this date any person  
cutting or removing timber from the  
public highways of the township of  
Holland, without having obtained the  
same from the Road Commissioner  
will be prosecuted according to law.  
By-law No. 5 appointing pathmakers  
etc., for 1903 was read and passed.

The council will meet again on  
Tuesday, May 26th.
