Where popular violence usurps the functions of justice, such crimes as this are bound to occur. The first person suspected is not always the guilty man, for an assassin may deliberately plan to direct suspicion against some other person. Those who murdered this innocent man should be brought to book for it, but there is little reason to suppose that anything will be done about it, or that even the mad practice of lynching will suffer a check from this exposure of its unsuitability as a means of dealing out justice. The wonder of the world is that there has not started up in the United States an anti-Lynching Society with branches everywhere, with millions of members and millions of revenue, with which to fight this great and law-destroying evil.
