There are a number of by-laws on the village of Markdale which should town. be in printed pamphlet form for the information and guidance of ratepayers generally. / These regulations are intended to prohibit: the running of cows at large, coasting or tobogganing on any portion of the public highway; the use of profane, loud or offensive language on the streets; the riding of bicycles, triscyles, hand wagons, hand sleighs, etc., on the sidewalk; pitching or throwing ball by hand or with lacrosse stick or otherwise on the street, or the kicking of football, etc. These with other regulations pertaining to the safety of pedestrians and the due observance of the morals of the town are to be strictly enforced on and after Saturday, the 9th May inst.
