A TRAGEDY OF YESTERDAY.

Robert Horning, a son of the first
writer at Horning's Mills, contributes
to the Shelburne Economist an in-
teresting sketch of his family history
and of early days at the Mills. Peter
Horning was the name of the first set-
tler. He was of Pennsylvania Dutch
stock, and came to Canada with his
father shortly after the Revolutionary
War. The family before leaving Penn-
sylvania, says Robert Horning in his
letter to the Economist, built a boat
on the shore of the Susquehanna River,
Pennsylvania. The father of the family
was up the river until he came to an
Indian trail. Two brothers of
the head of the family were living there
at the time, and when the travelers
arrived these brothers were fishing
with a hook and line in Burlington Bay
to keep them from starving—for this
was the year of the Canadian famine,
1838. The land that the city of Ham-
ilton now stands on was then valued at
9 cents per acre. About the year 1820
the father bought 2,500 acres in Mono,
Mimico and Melancthon. He hired
Robert Huston as guide, cleared 26
miles road through the woods, cut
down hills, and bridged streams to
make road for teams to travel. In 1825
two of the boys—Lewis and Oliver—
and Susan Van Meer went into the
woods after a cow and calf, and were
taken by the Indians. Jane was 16,
Susan 14, and the boys were each 9
years old. The father got all the
neighbors for miles around, and they

for the children for eight days, when

be dead. Oliver Van Meer (who was
born from the cradle) was two years

Fruit Prospects.

J. I. Graham, of Vandeleur, Grey
county, in a report to the Toronto Sun
on fruit prospects in his section says:
"I am pleased to see such favorable
reports for fruit generally. I am only
sorry we are not in it here. This will
certainly be an off year with us. Judging
from the blossom buds, there will not
be a quarter crop of apples. Last year
we had a very heavy bloom, but many
varieties dropped their apples when
about one inch in diameter. These, too,
show very few fruit buds, except Kings.
It is rare to have two consecutive years
of heavy bloom, even when there is no
crop. The Mann and Stark are the best
annual bearers we have, and are again
