

FOUL MURDER.

A Young School Girl Found Dead in the Woods near Collingwood. What at present appears to have been a most foul murder was brought to light Thursday morning by the finding of the body of Gloria, the thirteen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Whalen, in a bush in the southern limits of the town of Collingwood.

The victim of the awful affair is with her parents on the town line, between the town and the township of Nottawasaga, and attended the ward school in town, which is about a mile and a half from her home.

As it was her custom she started from her home Wednesday morning with a lunch and her books taking usual course across the fields to the tracks of the Grand Trunk Railway. This was the last time she was seen alive by her parents. She did not reach the school, but it was not until the evening, when, as she did not return, her parents became anxious and inquires among her school mates learned this fact.

As she had not been seen during the day, her parents instituted a search which was continued until she was found about daylight Thursday morning.

The body was lying in a ditch in cedar bushes, about one hundred feet from the railway track, and an distance from the edge of the road. It was so placed among the bushes to be entirely obscured from the view of any passers-by.

Her books and her lunch were by her side, the latter being intact when she left home.

The body bore some marks of most serious appearance, a gash across the forehead and a cut of the bony under the eye, evidently caused by a heavy blow. The skin was black, showing that the must have been received sometime before death.

On learning of the horrible crime Chief Wyde of the town police and Coroner Stephen went to the scene and the body removed to the mortuary. The body was removed to the mortuary for examination.

An inquest was opened at that afternoon. It is generally believed that the girl was assaulted and murdered deliberately. The man who it is said, was seen lurking in the bushes a few days previous to the killing, was brought before the Town Council for any information that would lead to the apprehension of the murderer.



## EUPHRASIA COUNCIL.

In accordance with public notice the council met and formed a Court of Revision to revise the assessment for the current year.
