SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The annual convention of the Euphrasia S. S. Association was held in Ebenezer Methodist church, on Tuesday, June 16th, the following officers being chosen: Hon. Pres., Rev. J. F. McLaren, D. D.; Pres., Mr. Peter Smith; Vice-Pres., Rev. T. R. White; Treasurer, Mr. Wm. Boyd; Sec., Mr. T. Gilray.

The opening exercises were conducted by the President, Rev. J. F. McLaren, D. D., leading in prayer. The minutes of the last convention were read by the Secretary, and adopted. Mr. Gilray, the Secretary, received a vote of thanks for his services during last convention, the sum of five dollars also being tendered as a slight recognition of his earnestness.

A motion was carried that Miss P. Sparling and Miss L. Neely be placed upon committee instead of Miss A. Patton and Dr. Danard, removed.

The first subject on the program had been assigned to the Rev. T. R. White, but in his absence Mr. Wm. Scott spoke on "Best Methods of Bible Class Teaching." His address upon this subject was very interesting.

Rev. T. R. White, having arrived, ably spoke on "The present attitude of the S. S. Association toward Temperance Legislation," showing the great evil of the liquor traffic at the present time. He advocated the total abolition of the bar as the only safeguard for the young.

Messrs. Scott, Morwood, Camplin, Fawcett, D. R. Ellis, P. Smith and the Revs. J. F. McLaren, D. D., and C. W. Reynolds in the discussion which followed quite agreed with the speaker. A motion was made and carried that a committee consisting of Rev. T. R. White, A. Morwood, Rev. C. W. Reynolds and Rev. J. F. McLaren, D. D., make a report on the Temperance Legislation at the evening session.

The address of Rev. C. W. Reynolds on "S. S. Finances," was well received. Mr. E. Fawcett also spoke on the subject and the following took part in the discussion: Messrs. Lyons, C. Morwood, D. R. Ellis, and the Rev. J. F. McLaren, D. D.

Mrs. J. Camplin took up the subject of "Methods in Teaching the Primary Class," and gave a very able and interesting paper. It was discussed by the following: Messrs. D. R. Ellis, C. Morwood, E. The report of the committee on Temperance Legislation was adopted, the following resolutions being embodied in the report:

1. That congregations and temperance societies be urged to unite in applying to the township council to submit the local option act to the voters of this township at the next municipal election, the Rev. C. W. Reynolds to be Convener.

2. That all persons in the locality who attend political conventions use their influence for candidates pledged to support temperance legislation.

3. That all officers and teachers of S. S. be urged to have the scholars take the temperance pledge.

4. That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the press of this county.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Hon. Pres., Rev. J. F. McLaren, D. D.; Pres., Mr. D. R. Ellis; Vice-Pres., Mr. Peter Smith; Treas., Mr. Wm. Boyd; Sec., Mr. Thomas Gilray; Committee: Mrs. P. Sparling, Miss L. Neely, Mr. Wm. Scott and Mr. J. A. Camplin.

The treasurer's report for day showed receipts \$4.13, disbursements \$7.13. A motion was carried that in future a copy of program be sent to every person taking part; also that each S. S. Superintendent receive ten copies. It was decided to hold the next convention at Kimberley; A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the ladies of Ebenezer for the very excellent refreshments provided for all present at the convention.

The "question drawer" was answered by the Rev. C. W. Reynolds, Rev. J. F. McLaren, D. D., Rev. C. W. Reynolds, P. Smith and C. Morwood discussing the questions and answers given. The Rev. J. F. Soul, assessed jointly with Mrs. Soul; J. W. Patterson and G. W. Patterson to be assessed as tenant for lot 20 and 30 and A. C. Patterson as owner. The Court arose.

HO! FOR THE WEST! Mr. Thomas Mercer, of Markdale, writes interestingly of a recent trip to that Country.
