### FLESHERTON HAPPENINGS

Our fair Dominion will this week celebrate her 37th anniversary under circumstances most favorable. Blessed as she is with peace and unity, national health, and a very large measure of prosperity, it behooves her people to engage in more than social festivities and gala day celebrations. While engaged in these pleasurable acts of national patriotism, quite proper for a loyal young Dominion, there should also go up from a grateful people heartfelt thanksgiving and praise to the Giver of all our mercies, who alone canst continue the same.

"Happy is that nation whose God is the Lord." May it be ever so of Canada! May it ever be the desire of her people that Christ be enthroned in the heart; that His gospel of peace, purity and brotherhood be more and more the supreme law of her national life.

The bi-centenary of John Wesley's birth was fittingly celebrated in the Methodist Church here on Sabbath last. The morning service was under the auspices of the League and was conducted by the president, Mr. J. P. Bunt. Short appropriate papers were read as follows: "When Methodism Began," Mrs. W. A. Armstrong; "John Wesley's Industry," Miss Kate Bellamy; "John Wesley's Generosity," Mr. J. E. Fawcett; "John Wesley's Death," Mr. J. P. Bunt. Dr. Christie also took part in the service, and valuable assistance was rendered by the choir. In the evening the pastor, Rev. Mr. Wilson, took the service, and in commencing his discourse said he was not going to select a text but had done so would have in all reverence thought none more appropriate than John 1: 6, "There was a man sent from God whose name was John." After speaking of his belief in the call of God to Wesley and paying a fitting tribute to the memory of the man thus called to a great work and to become the founder of Methodism, Mr. Wilson proceeded with an excellent and eloquently delivered address on the distinctive features of Methodism, which were dealt with under the following divisions: "Knowledge of sins forgiven," "Personal testimony," "Definiteness of teaching," "Evangelism," "Missionary." In conclusion Mr. Wilson said great privileges had been enjoyed, and consequently great responsibility rested upon the Church which he urged to be true to her trust.

Evangelist T. A. Rodger, who has on several occasions assisted Rev. L. W. Thom here and at Eugenia, has been appointed by the Presbyterian Church as evangelist in the Northwest Territories with headquarters at Calgary. Mr. Rodger is much beloved and the prayers of very many who have been blessed under his preaching will follow him to his new field of labor upon which he enters in August next. Rev. M. N. Bentum, who has also assisted in evangelistic work here and is an impressive preacher, has been engaged by the Presbyterian Union, Toronto, to conduct tent evangelistic meetings in the city during the summer. The services we learn are being largely attended and much good is being earnestly prayed for by all engaged in the soul-saving work.
