Those farmers who are sowing test tracts of alfalfa should not expert the same results as though sowing clover. The alfalfa at first is a slow grower, it does practically nothing the first season, and many a plot is ploughed up by a clover farmer and the crop denounced as a failure at just about the time it is beginning to make a little progress toward showing up "a stand."

ADMINISTERING A DRENCH.


The usual method of giving liquid medicines to domestic animals is by means of drenching that is, pouring it down the patient's throat. This is usually done by means of a junk bottle. But it is awkward to handle and liable to be broken by contact with the animal's teeth. A drenching tube is much more satisfactory and one should be kept on every farm. It may be made of an ordinary funnel, a piece of half inch rubber hose three feet long, and a piece of iron gas pipe five or six inches long, and of proper diameter to fit snugly into one end of the rubber hose. Into the other end insert the narrow end of the tin funnel and the instrument is complete.

To use this, raise the animal's nose just high enough for fluid to hun down its throat, insert the tube between its teeth and pour the medicine into the funnel. This requires two men, one to hold the animal's head steady and manage the tube, while the other pours down the medicine!

THE GREEK EXECUTIONER. In Greece the death penalty is, taid to be often pronounced, but the difficulty of obtaining executioners was for a long time almost insuperable. It was at last surmounted by giving to a murderer the choice beween his own death or acceptance of the office of permanent executioner. The man lives alone in an fold tower built by Venetians on an islet outside the port of Nauplia, where necessaries are taken to him every morning by the boatman, who is careful to exchange no word with him. Twice a year a steamer calls for him and his instruments of death, and he leaves upon a tour of executions.


