FLESHERTON HAPPENINGS

On Wednesday afternoon last week the Methodist church here was the scene of a pretty marguerite wedding in which much interest was taken, not only on account of its public character, but because of the popularity of the fair young bride, as well as the high esteem in which the bridegroom is held in the community.

The happy couple, who at hymen's altar plighted their love, were Mr. Jackson E. Fawcett, principal of the Flesherton public school, and Miss Annie Joy, youngest daughter of the late Mr. R. B. Joy, of this place. The ceremony, which took place at a few minutes after one o'clock, was performed by the young couple's pastor, Rev. J. S. L. Wilson, B. A., assisted by the Rev. L. W. Thom, pastor of Chalmers Church, and was witnessed by about thirty invited guests and a large company of interested spectators. Mrs. W. W. Trimble, organist of the church, played the wedding march to the strains of which the bridal party entered, the bride leaning on the arm of her brother, Mr. W. Joy, of Toronto Junction. The bride was attired in a dainty gown of white organdie, trimmed with valenciennes lace. She also wore a bridal veil with wreath and carried a bouquet of white carnations. The only ornament worn was a pretty gold brooch studded with diamonds, the gift of the groom. The bride's sister, Miss Minnie Joy, acted as bridesmaid. She wore a pretty gown of ivory white cashmere, a white chiffon hat and carried pink carnations. The groom's brother, Mr. G. Fawcett, of Forest, discharged the duties of groomsmen. The ushers were Messrs. J. A. Boyd, J. P. Bunt, John Stewart and Dr. Murray. The church was prettily decorated with marguerites and ferns as was also the home of the bride's mother, where, following the ceremony, congratulations were tendered the bride and groom and a choice wedding breakfast was served. The Methodist church choir, of which the young couple are members, were among the guests and presented the bride, who is their pleasing alto soloist, with a handsome ornamental clock. The array of beautiful wedding presents also included a fancy chair and table from the pupils of the Flesherton public school as a token of their esteem for their principal. The groom's gift to the bride, in addition to the brooch worn, was a beautiful watch and chain, the case being ornamented with a diamond crescent and artistically engraved; to the bridesmaid he gave a pretty pearl and ruby ring. The bride's going-away gown was a navy blue snow-flake cloth prettily stitched with white. With this was worn a white silk blouse and stylish hat in blue and white. Mr. and Mrs. Fawcett were escorted to the depot and left on the five o'clock train to spend a month at Toronto, Forest, Sarnia and other points, after which they will settle in their new home—Mr. Lawrence's residence, Hill street.

That Cupid had been further busy was evidenced in the conduct of another esteemed and happy couple who also on Wednesday afternoon of last week stood at the marriage altar and solemnly promised to love, serve and honor each other till death does them part. The two thus removed to the kingdom of benedicts were Mr. Thomas Kerr, second son of Mr. and Mrs. John Kerr, of Artoesia, and Miss Nellie Hastie, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. Hastie, of this place. The young couple, attended by Mr. Fred Teeter and Miss Ida Thompson, drove to Markdale, where at one o'clock in Christ Church Rectory the marriage was performed by Rev. J. R. Newell, after which they returned to the home of the bride's parents, where the wedding repast was served. The bride was married in a pretty gown of white organdie trimmed with baby ribbon and chiffon. The bridesmaid wore a gown of pink organdie and black picture hat. The bride's travelling suit was a navy blue cloth skirt and velvet coat, with which she wore a fancy toque of blue and white. 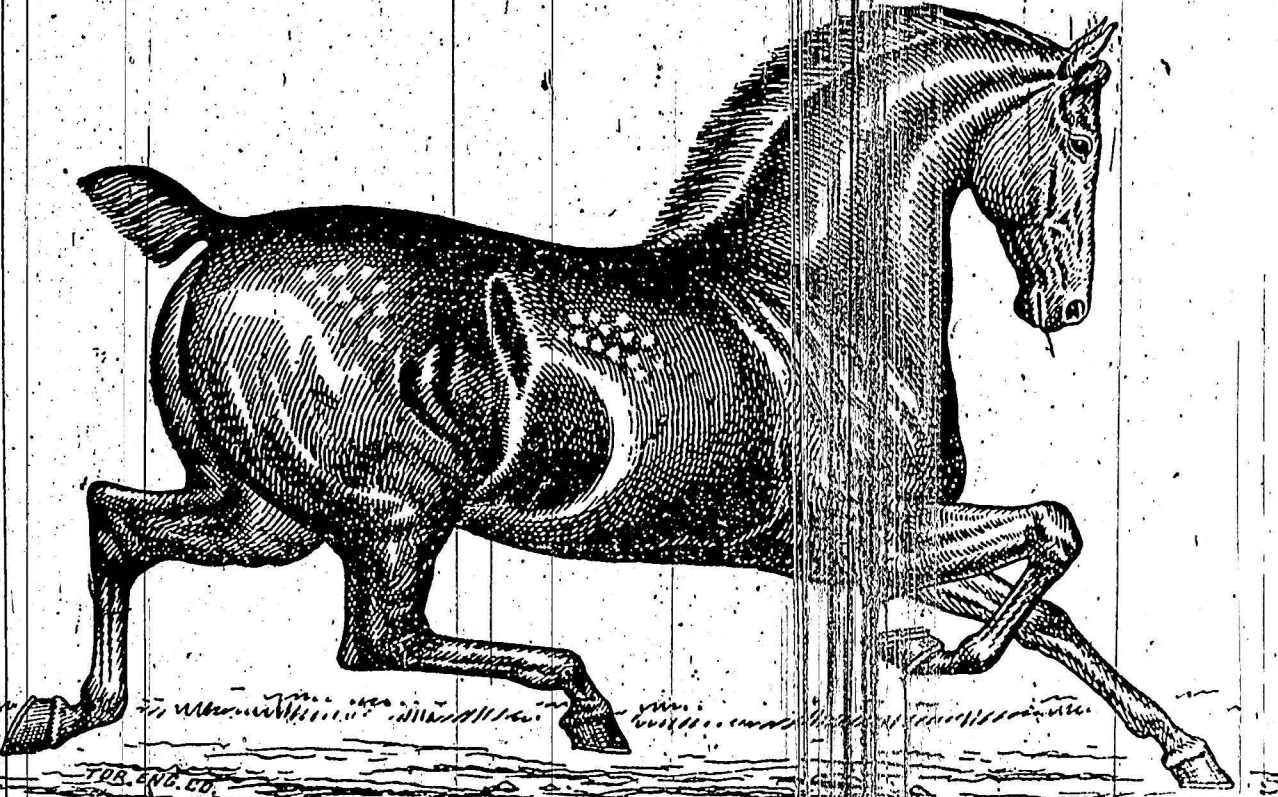
