Recipes for the Kitchen. Hygiene and Other Notes for the Housekeeper.

DOMESTIC RECIPES.

Cream Cake. Two cups sugar, one Turn one pt. lukewarm milk gill sup each of butter and sweet milk, ly into the paste, and stir three cups of flour before sliting; the smooth and thoroughly mixed whites of seven eggs, well beater, turn into a deep dish. White Salad Dressing.-Put a rounding spoonful of butter and half rich, thick, sweetened cream cup of sweet cream into a sauce- jumbles pan; heat to boiling; then add; gradually, a rounding teaspoonful prinstarch, moistened with a fourth of a cup of cold sweet milk and cook for five minutes, or until it is well thickened. Add a level teaspoonful each of sugar and salt, a fourth of a teaspoonful of black pepper and a dash of cayenne, a rounding tablespoonful of prepared mustard and one-fourth of a cup of lemon fuice. they can move out at a couple of Mix very thoroughly.
