SEND DOWN THE HOEQES.

The country tramp, formerly the lonfer and recipient of backdoor handouts from sympathetic housewives, says the Toronto Globe, is now the hardened criminal. The skilful burglar, with sledge-hammer, jimmy and powder-can, has dropped out, and the "kit" that has become an easy mark has been supplemented by the bottle of play an exhibition on Friday evening nitro-glycerine, a cake of soap, and a handful of detonating caps, more easily concealed and far more effective. People now are "onto" the old professionals, and the safecracker and the train robber appear in the guise of the unfortunates who asks for a sandwich, tells a hard-luck story, and maybe presents a union card, which; if examined will be found to be several

months in arrears. The new disguise of the tough makes his presence a greater menace, and the story of the Ontario Government's pursuit of his class, resulting in his present scarcity in this country, forms an interesting page in our criminal history. It was told last evening in an interview by Provincial Detective Jos. E. Rogers, who has had charge of the work since it was inaugurated, four years ago. In his words the tramps the Markdale boys rushed matters and have come to hate this Province so much that in writing from the other side to pals who are in durance vile at the Central Prison, they have been known to ask their comrades to hurry back to "God's country, where a decent man is allowed to earn a living.'

The propaganda against the hoboes, which was entered upon with zest by Attorney-General Gibson, followed the revelation that the Bowmanville and bundred. other robberies which had taken place, were the work of tramps. The two great railways, after consultation, concurred in the scheme, and in the first campaign, Rogers and his eight assistants rounded up 70 hoboes and had them sent to the Central. In the following spring the round-up resulted in the capture of forty, and in the fall of the same year the number was only twenty-five. In the year and three months preceeding January, 1902, 357 persons were committed to the Central Prison as vagrants. All this caused a remarkable emigration of the ragged, bearded fraternity. For instance in Brockville the first year of the campaign 250 tramps were given lodging in the local lockup. The next year this was reduced to 100, and the following year to almost nothing. In 1901 big hauls, but were disappointed; last year it was the same, and this year, after travelling 2,000 miles, not a hobo

For a new departure our winter meetings are well attended, many, no doubt, attending through curiosity to find out what the new fad meant, but I am pleased to say that after nearly. every meeting the sentiment expressed was one of genuine respect for the Institute and those taking an active

part in the work. As might have been expected, mistakes were made by reason of the entire newness of this kind of work to most of us, but I think we may congratulate ourselves that the mistakes. were neither many nor serious. But for all that we feel that there is a great work ahead of us, so big in fact that one is practically tempted to shirk it, but it is hard to sit still, knowing the

tremendous difference there is between what is and what might be in the conditions of Canadian farm life.

I am pleased to be able to report that we have a capital complement of branch officers, and if we can but keep this kind of school in working order for a year or two more you may anticipate great results.

Personally it has been one of the greatest pleasures and surprises, of my life in the short experience while at work in our winter meetings, to meet and make so many warm friends.

It is impossible to take part in this work without getting a broader and more cheerful view of life, and for this, if for nothing else, the Institute should. recommend itself to every woman."
