The Financial District Meeting and Convention for the deepening of spiritual life among the ministers and members of the Owen Sound District was held in the Methodist Church, Markdale, on Wednesday and Thursday the 16th and 17th inst., the chairman of the district, Rev. N. Wellwood, presiding. Through illness the Revs. McAteer, Wilson and Roach were absent. Owing to a gracious revival at Woodford, the pastor, Rev. T. G. Barlow, could not leave the great work and come down; and the incessant down-pour of rain kept many of the laity away. This made the attendance much smaller than it otherwise would have been. All expressed themselves as being greatly helped, benefited and encouraged by the convention.
