Boys in Demand. This year over 1,200 Barnardo boys have left England for Canada. This is considerably the largest number ever brought out in one year. The applications for boys from Ontario farmers and others have, however, been far in excess of the supply. For every boy available there are on the average a half dozen applications. Under the circumstances, some of the officials connected with Children's Aid Societies have suggested the unwisdom of keeping young boys in the Government industrial schools, when good homes could easily be found for them.

Such a scarcity of teachers in Ontario prevails that the education department has under consideration the question of admitting to the Normal schools the students who have passed the junior leaving examination, but who have not had the year's experience the regulations require. Low salaries are said to be the primary and almost only reason for the dearth of teachers. The Deputy Minister of Education, Mr. John Millar, holds that the teachers of the province are poorly paid, and until the teaching profession is made more attractive in a pecuniary sense, desirable young men and women will not be secured. He makes the somewhat radical proposal that a legislative grant be made to boards of school trustees and apportioned according to the educational attainments of the teachers they employ. He points out also that unless higher salaries are paid, the result will be that permits to teach will have to be granted, and while teachers may be secured in this way, they will not have the proper experience or training so necessary to the successful instruction of children.
