Marketing half-fattened, fattened. with their crops full of half-rotten food, is a poor way to make money. into the lake or furnace if sent to Toronto; indeed fowl with their crops full of food if sent to Toronto are invariably contiscated by the Inspector. From our experience and talks with the buyers we add a few pointers. First, fatten wel!. Abstain from feeding 24 hours before killing. Kill by bleeding in the neck. Pluck clean while body is warm. Leave head and feet on turkeys and chickens; cut head off ducks and geese. Do not draw entrails. Don't scald. The last process is readily detected by the buyers who will not pay within one or two cents per pound they will for dry plucked fowl. A little attention to these points will put hundreds of dollars more in your ockets.
