

SHORTAGE IN LUMBER OUT.
The Season in Ottawa Valley Mills Not a Good One.

A despatch from Ottawa says: The season at the many saw mills in the Ottawa district has closed. Despite the activity in the lumber market and the high prices and good demand for the manufactured article, there has been a number of failures of the total cut of lumber as compared with former years. The reduction is placed by most in a position to size up the situation at ten per cent. For the season the cut at Booth's mill at Chaboussé was between 3,000,000 and 15,000,000 feet less than it was last year. The regular cut at the Booth mill is about 125,000,000 feet. At McLachlan's mill at Arnprior the cut at the mill is less than it was last year. In the case of other large plants there has been a decrease in the cut. Mill failures are at a loss to account for the decrease in the season's output. It will prove a serious matter, as demand for good-quality lumber is increasing. At least another year's conditions are believed to be the result of the shortage in the lumber market.
